
Over £21m secured for future sport and leisure projects:

• **£1.3m** allocated from the Greater Norwich Infrastructure Investment Fund, to support 3 sport and leisure infrastructure projects; Aylsham Sports Hub, Eaton Park & The Nest.

• **£8.3m** secured through the Levelling Up Fund and Greater Norwich Infrastructure Investment Fund, for improvements at Sloughbottom Park.

• £570k grant awarded to complete energy efficiency projects at Wymondham Leisure Centre and Riverside Leisure Centre.

• £3.95m secured for improvement works at Diss Leisure Centre, with investment from the Public Sector Decarbonisation Fund and South Norfolk Council.



Sport and leisure projects, worth over £2m, were successfully delivered including improvements at Yare Boat Club and Crusaders Rugby Club.

Projects worth over £750k, were delivered to help enhance the quality of community trails and open spaces, including improvements at Frenze Beck and The Yare Valley Walk.


